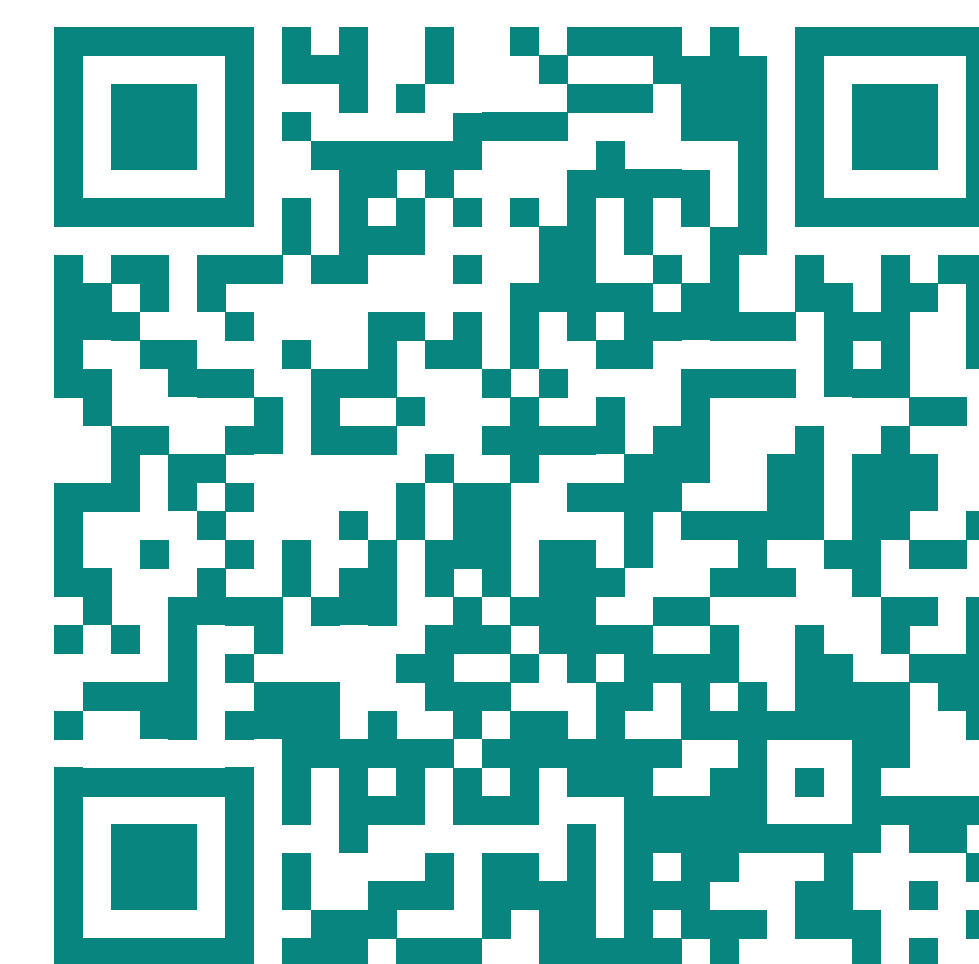
DESCRIPTION
